1. THE IUCN PROJECT PORTAL AND IUCN PROJECT MANAGEMENT PRACTICES

The IUCN Project Portal was developed to provide an online, centralized information system that is the primary source for the IUCN Secretariat project information. The Secretariat has approximately 1,000 staff members in 50 countries. At the end of 2022 the IUCN portfolio comprised 556 projects in 166 countries with a value of approximately CHF 907 million.

The Portal comprises a database of basic project information in the form of a project data sheet for each project and workflows to implement IUCN's project appraisal and approval system. These forms collectively provide standardized, transparent and relevant information from across IUCN. This information allows for customized reports for viewing and managing portfolios to be provided through online dashboards and therefore providing more accurate, timely and up-to-date reports for managers. This also provides an enhanced capacity to establish and monitor targets, indicators and baselines. There is also the ability to track IUCN's
