Tune in to the tuna debate

WHAT'S HAPPENING: A Sustainable Tuna Roundtable to bring together the tuna fishing industry and the retail industry. The meeting, organized by IUCN and the Western Pacific Fishery Management Council, will be used to try to get both industries to agree on a single set of standards to assess the sustainability of tuna catches.

WHY IT'S HAPPENING: There are a growing number of organizations (NGOs, the fishing industry and retail industry) with different sustainability assessment methods, certification schemes, ranking guides and checklists. The most well-known and largest is currently the Marine Stewardship Council. The retail industry has expressed a strong demand for the development of a single set of global standards.

WHEN IT'S HAPPENING: Monday, April 21, 2008, at the Manos Conference Centre, Brussels, ahead of the European Seafood Exposition.

SPOKESPERSON:

- "Tuna is running out stocks of this valuable fish are fully exploited and some are over-fished or depleted," says Carl Lundin, Head of IUCN's Global Marine Programme. "It is unlikely that major tuna species can sustain greater catches. Voluntary industry measures aren't working – we need to come up with something better."
- "We want to improve communication between the commercial tuna fishing industry and retailers and buyers who have sustainable seafood sourcing policies," says Eric Gilman, IUCN's Marine Science Advisor. "They need to work out standards for sustainably-sourced tuna, how to assess them and how to certify fisheries and companies."
- "Retailers and buyers have the power to change things," says Carl Lundin, Head of IUCN's Global Marine Programme. "By demanding better and more sustainable seafood, consumers can address the core conservation issues in tuna fisheries."

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
